Special Note: Since March 17, 2020, the Metro Davidson Detention Facility have not had visitations or volunteers in the facility. Currently inmates are attending education classes, in small numbers (less than 15). The chaplains make regularly visits to each unit to provide care and assist the inmates that are dealing with bereavement, personal crisis, or family issues. Bible study devotions, recreational activities (crosswords puzzles, sudoku etc.), and reading material (books, bibles, and handouts) are given to the inmates as well. In terms of COVID-19, we have 29 inmates and one unit on quarantine. We have had staff tested positive for COVID-19. A few are still on quarantine and others are recovering. No death has been reported concerning COVID-19.

Special Note: Because of COVID-19, the facility continued to have restrictions pertaining to volunteers and visitations. There have been no volunteers, no visitations, or services held at the facility since March. This has become a stressor to the inmates, which has become problematic at times. To deescalate the stressor, chaplains visited the inmates' units frequently providing individual counseling sessions. These visits also included restrictive housing. Every week recreation material was distributed to the inmates (puzzles, sudoku, word search, adult coloring pages, magazines, notebook paper, and library books). Considering the inmates, the administration team made the approval for education classes to resume with 10 students or less until there was a COVID outbreak from July to August. The classes were stopped. We had 145 active COVID cases. The inmates were placed in another building for 45 days. Since that time all have recovered and so have the employees that were infected. The remaining staff were tested, and they were negative for COVID. Hallelujah to Our God!
